

Our Congressional Delegation

- 12 Senators from the six states (10 D's − 2 R's)
- 37 House seats all, or partially, in the watershed (including DC Delegate among them) – 19 D's – 18 R's
 - \circ NY 5 (1 D/4 R's/)
 - \circ MD 8 (7 D's/1R)
 - \circ VA 11 (7 D's/4 R's)
 - \circ PA 8 (2 D's/6 R's)
 - \circ WV 3 (3 R's)
 - \circ DE 1 (1 D)
 - DC 1 Delegate (1 D)

What Happened in the 116th Congress?

The Omnibus Funding Bill

- The FY21 Omnibus Funding bill gave us historically high funding levels for some key clean water programs in this region.
 - \$87 million for the EPA Chesapeake Bay Program
 - \$3 million for Chesapeake Gateways
 - \$15 million for USGS Chesapeake watershed activities

ACE Act Sets Some Markers

America's Conservation Enhancement (ACE) Act passed both the House and Senate unanimously last year. This package included three Chesapeake Bay bills:

- Reauthorization of the EPA Chesapeake Bay Program (\$90-\$92 million annually)
- Creation of the Chesapeake WILD habitat restoration program under the US Fish & Wildlife Service (\$15 million annually)
- Reauthorization of the Nat'l Park Service's Chesapeake Gateways Program (\$3 million annually)

Biden Administration

- Re-establish EPA Senior Advisor for the Chesapeake Bay and Anacostia River

Federal Funding

- 1. The President issues his Fiscal Year Budget Request to Congress on the first Monday of February (sometimes)
- 2. Both the House and Senate are required to produce a budget every year, and ocassionally do so
- 3. Congress uses the President's Budget Request as the base for appropriating money every year through 12 appropriation bills

Choose Clean Water Coalition on the President's FY22 Budget Request

Chesapeake WILD (FWS) - \$15 million

EPA Chesapeake Bay Program - \$90.5 million

NPS Chesapeake Gateways & Trails - \$3 million

Rescinding Trump Administration Rules

- Rollback the rollbacks
 - WOTUS
 - 401 Certification
 - NEPA
 - Diversity Training

Ask 1 - Please support increased funding to the new \$90.5 million authorization level for the EPA Chesapeake Bay Program and its local grant programs?

- We asked for \$90.5m last year and Congress increased funding for \$85m to \$87.5m.
- But since then Congress, in the ACE Act, reauthorized the Bay Program at higher numbers - \$90.5m in FY22
- We still support raising the funding level for the EPA Chesapeake Bay Program to **\$90.5 million** in FY22.
- This is the Coalition's HIGHEST PRIORITY request.



Bay Program Grants to States

- More than 71% of the Bay Program's funding goes directly to the states or local communities for local restoration. – this is the FY20 breakdown for \$85 million:
- DC- \$3.4 million
- DE \$2.9 million
- MD \$13.6 million
- NY \$3.6 million
- PA \$19.6 million
- VA \$14.0 millon
- WV- \$3.3 million
- TOTAL = \$60.5 million

EPA HQ Taps into CBP \$

- In FY20 EPA HQ siphoned off \$3.452m from the \$85m CBP Budget to be used in the Office of Water, Office of General Counsel Office of Information Management, Office of Administration or the Office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance
- No goods or services were given to the CBP in return

Ask 2 – Please Support \$15 million for Chesapeake WILD

- ACE authorized this new habitat program for the US Fish & Wildlife Service
- ACE was signed into law so late in the appropriations process last year that Congress could not fund anything in its first year – FY21
- It is imperative to appropriate funding to establish and implement this new habitat protection and restoration program throughout the Bay watershed.

Ask 3 – Please support substantially increasing the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (SRF)up to \$10 billion?

- We support Congressional efforts to substantially increase funding for the CW SRF as part of a Federal infrastructure spending package.
- There are 1,779 local governments in the Bay watershed that rely on the Clean Water SRF.
- We also support targeting 20% of these funds toward green infrastructure projects and setting aside at least 20% in each state for additional subsidization for disadvantaged communities.
