Federal Office Directors (FOD) -History

- Originally established in January 2008 as an ad hoc body of the directors of federal program offices.
- Formed to foster coordinated interagency planning and decision-making relative to federal protection and restoration activities in the Chesapeake Bay watershed.
- Replaced the Chesapeake Bay Program's (CBP) defunct Federal Agencies Committee.
- With the establishment of the Federal Leadership Committee for the Chesapeake Bay (FLC) through Executive Order (EO) 13508, the FOD became the de facto principal interagency body for coordinating all federal EO activities at the level below the FLC.

FOD – Membership

FOD members are the directors, designated senior management level official, or coordinator of federal program offices focused on Chesapeake watershed protection and restoration.

FOD - Activities

The FOD provides support for the FLC and FLC-D including but not limited to:

- Coordinating development of federal 2-year milestones;
- Coordinating development of an annual progress report;
- Developing and supporting adaptive management processes;
- Formulating messaging and communications relative to implementation of the EO;
- Supporting necessary meetings of the FLC through briefings, meeting planning and follow-up actions;
- Representing and advocating on behalf of federal agency positions to EPA, who serves on behalf of the federal government at the Executive Council of the Chesapeake Bay Program; and
- Identifying and filling leadership roles within the CBP organizational structure and promoting leadership by example through environmental management at federal facilities.

FOD - Guidelines



Serves as a primary coordination mechanism for ensuring that EPA is fully aware of, knowledgeable about, and a strong advocate for individual and collective agency positions on policy and other matters of importance to all federal agencies.



Serves as the venue for articulation of these positions and providing EPA with specific information (e.g., position statements) to represent the federal government at meetings of the Principals Staff Committee and Executive Council.



Where there is collective interest by more than one federal agency, FOD will serve as the forum for developing consensus on such issues and formulating a shared federal position.



Serve as the liaison between federal agencies, including members of the Federal Leadership Committee and their designees (established under Executive Order 13508), to ensure policy coordination and representation for this level of the federal government.



Serves as the liaison between the Council on Environmental Quality and Office of Management and Budget to ensure that the provisions of EO 13508 are fully represented in the Watershed Agreement or are otherwise addressed to ensure that the purposes and intent of those provisions are executed.

FOD – Reflective of the federal family

Executive Council

Federal agencies are formally represented by the EPA on the EC.

Principals' Staff Committee

- •Federal membership to the PSC consists of a federal delegation at a level commensurate with the state secretary level.
- •Federal agencies are represented by the EPA on the PSC.


Management Board

- •The MB membership includes the core federal agency partners.
- •EPA will represent the federal government if a vote is required.

Federal Leadership Committee (FLC)




EO 13508 states the "Federal Leadership Committee for the Chesapeake Bay is established to oversee the development and coordination of programs and activities, including data management and reporting, of agencies participating in protection and restoration of the Chesapeake Bay.



The Committee shall manage the development of strategies and program plans for the watershed and ecosystem of the Chesapeake Bay and oversee their implementation.



The Committee shall be chaired by the Administrator of the EPA, or the Administrator's designee, and include senior representatives of the USDA, Commerce, DOD, Homeland Security, the Interior, Transportation, and such other agencies as determined by the Committee."



This role has largely been delegated to a set of "designees" of the aforementioned agencies, known as the "FLC-D."

WHAT ARE PEOPLE SAYING?



Majority of feedback was supportive and/or will be held for Phase 2.



Revisions to the Watershed Agreement should be completed by the end of 2025.



All Executive Council members should reaffirm their commitment to the partnership at the 2024 Executive Council meeting.



Greater emphasis on conservation, climate change implications, recommendations from the CESR report and involving diverse and underserved populations in the partnership's work.

Overarching Themes

- Enhanced accountability and evidence-based restoration practices.
- Conservation as a focal area and integration into pillars of restoration and science.
- Address local and regional priorities of climate resilience, environmental justice, and other "emerging" issues.
- Importance of collaboration and balancing needs across all partners.
- Inclusive public engagement to foster greater transparency and trust.
- Technical assistance and financial support to sustain and grow local implementation activities.

EC Recommendation 1

Areas of Support

- Continued commitment to the 2014 Agreement
- Inclusive and holistic approach
- Support for addressing climate change and other emerging issues
- Strengthening the processes for evidence building (social science, monitoring needs, and measuring progress)
- Acknowledging the Beyond 2025 effort and challenge at hand.

Areas of Concern

- Timing strong calls for refreshed Agreement by end of 2025.
- Vagueness in recommendations, lack of prioritization.
- Lack of focus on accountability mechanisms.

EC Recommendation 2

Areas of Support

- Simplification of Structure and Processes
- Revising and Strengthening Accountability
- Equity and Inclusivity
- Robust monitoring and data integration to inform decision-making
- Focus on living resources and healthy communities

Areas of Concern

- Call for more detailed specifics of "simplification" and concern of unintended consequences of simplification.
- Acknowledge tension between addressing climate change, emerging issues and, efforts to streamline.
