

SRS Workgroup Chair Nomination: Kirk Havens

Dr. Havens is the Director of the Center for Coastal Resources Management at the Virginia Institute of Marine Science and a professor of marine science in the William & Mary Batten School of Coastal and Marine Sciences. He was the Virginia gubernatorial appointee to the Chesapeake **Bay Program's Scientific & Technical Advisory Committee** (STAC) under five governors (appointed by Gov. Warner, reappointed by Governors Kaine, McDonnell, McAuliffe, and Northam). He served as both Vice-Chair and Chair of STAC. He presently chairs the Leadership Council for the Albemarle-Pamlico National Estuary Partnership and serves on the **Board of Directors of the Coastal Studies Institute, a multi**institutional research and educational partnership of the UNC System including East Carolina University, North Carolina State University, UNC-Chapel Hill, UNC Wilmington, and Elizabeth City State University. His professional career has focused on research in support of policy development and decision-making in coastal and marine ecosystems.



LLWG Chair Nomination: Les Knapp

Leslie Knapp, Jr. (Les) currently serves as Water and Science Administration Assistant Director for the Maryland Department of the Environment. He has been with the Department since 2022, serving first as a Senior Local Government Advisor and then as Government Relations Director.

Prior to this, he worked for the Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) for nearly 16 years as Legal and Policy Counsel. There he split his time between researching legal and policy issues, advocacy, participating in or observing various commissions and task forces, and preparing MACo's annual conferences. His primary policy issues during his time at MACo included the environment, land use, government liability and courts, public information and ethics, public safety, and parks and recreation.

Les started his career with the Maryland Department of Legislative Services, which provides technical and staff support to members of the Maryland General Assembly. He spent one Session as a bill drafter, one as an amendment writer, and four as staff on the House Appropriations Committee. During his time on Appropriations, he worked on budget and policy issues dealing with health and human services, public safety, and pensions.



She spent four years working with the Virginia **Association of Soil & Water Conservation** Districts (VASWCD) which included work on the **Virginia Conservation Assistance Program (VCAP) and coordination of statewide** education programs including the Envirothon program.
