This month: a closer look at Advisory Committees

### What is most relevant to us?

- Top priority: remaining aware of activities related to the Ag Advisory Committee
  - O No updates since last meeting
- Three other CBP Advisory Committees: all potentially relevant to our work
  - O Local Government Advisory Committee (1987)
  - O Scientific & Technical Advisory Committee (1984)
  - *Stakeholders*' Advisory Committee (1984)
- Existing Advisory Committees have expressed interest in working closely with the AAC, particularly as it is getting started

### What is most relevant to us?

- High-level overview of the three ACs
  - *Who* is represented on each AC?
  - O What does each AC do?
  - O Do opportunities for collaboration on shared priorities exist?
    - Representatives from each AC expressed interest in engaging with the AgWG
- As we outline what we want to accomplish as a group:
  - O We will be able to identify overlap between our priorities and AAC priorities
  - O We can consider opportunities to work with all ACs to more efficiently reach our goals (and assist them in achieving ag-related goals that they may have)

### Advisory Committees: background, and what they all do

Three ACs established in 1980s to "provide independent perspectives from critical stakeholder groups and strengthen the natural and social science basis for Bay protection and restoration activities" and act as "the independent thinkers and advisors to the Executive Council (EC), Principals' Staff Committee (PSC), and Management Board (MB)."

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- Three ACs established in 1980s to "provide independent perspectives from critical stakeholder groups and strengthen the natural and social science basis for Bay protection and restoration activities" and act as "the independent thinkers and advisors to the Executive Council (EC), Principals' Staff Committee (PSC), and Management Board (MB)."
- Several responsibilities consistent across the three ACs (full list on p.21 of CBP governance document):
  - O Make independent **recommendations** to the EC, PSC, and MB [annual report]
  - O Participate in EC, PSC, and MB meetings as advisors; provide updates on AC activity
  - O Participate in **development and implementation of Management Strategies** developed as part of the Watershed Agreement as appropriate
  - Establish annual priorities that support CBP strategic priorities and the progress of the Agreement Goals and Outcomes
  - Advise the GITs and the Action Teams as needed

Purpose: advise the Executive Council on how to effectively implement projects and engage the support of local governments to achieve the goals of the Bay Agreement through 1) sharing the views and insights of local elected officials with state and federal decision-makers and 2) enhancing the flow of information among local governments.

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- Goals (not an exhaustive list):
  - Promote ongoing communication and engagement between local govts and CBP
  - O Promote local govt implementation of local water quality/quantity initiatives
  - O Champion local govt priorities/needs within the CBP and with state, fed partners

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  - O Champion local govt priorities/needs within the CBP and with state, fed partners
- Membership: 24 members (all gubernatorial/mayoral appointees)
  - O Current or formal local elected or appointed officials or members of an organization representing the interests of local government
  - O City, county, township representatives on current membership list

#### **Events**

- Local Government Forums
  - O Annual meetings hosted by LGAC, Alliance for the Chesapeake, NFWF
  - O Identify issues that limit/strategies that support local implementation of watershed protection initiatives
  - O Roundtable: Lancaster Clean Water Partners & Campbell Foundation
- Wandering Waterways Tour Series
  - O Bringing local elected officials to see conservation in practice
  - O <u>Wandering Delmarva's Waterways</u> benefits of BMPs; impacts of saltwater intrusion; value of ag land preservation

#### Resources

  - O Bay restoration resources tailored to the communication needs of leaders in local government; Learning Library: <u>Understanding and Supporting Ag Allies</u>
- Watershed Currents Newsletter
  - O Bimonthly distribution of local case studies and informational resources

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  - O Host technical workshops
  - O Serve as liaison between the scientific community and CBP
- Membership: 38 members (11 gubernatorial/mayoral appointees; 6 federal scientists appointed by CBP Director; 21 at-large nominated by STAC members) possessing relevant scientific knowledge in needed areas of expertise
  - O Substantial academic representation
  - Several STAC members familiar to the AgWG

- Workshops forum for developing recommendations from scientific/technical community on information needs, opportunities for collaborations, and further management actions.
  - O Using carbon to achieve CBW water quality goals and climate resiliency (biochar workshop; 2024)
  - Identifying knowledge gaps to support market-based approaches to CBW restoration (2025)
  - O Workshops can be proposed by STAC members or by a CBP partner/group in collaboration with a current STAC member

- STAC Workshop RFP
  - Organized to gather critically needed scientific/technical information related to protection and restoration of CB watershed
  - FY25 workshop applications due 2/10; must convene by May 31, 2026
  - \$15,000 available for each workshop activities
- Programmatic workshops outcomes provide Partnership with actionable recommendations assessing where, when, who and how science can be implemented
- State of the Science workshops gather stakeholders to assess gaps in knowledge and science needs around a specific topic, producing research recommendations and strategies to address gaps

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- Priorities (not an exhaustive list):
  - O Monitoring progress toward achieving TMDL water quality goals, outcomes in Watershed Agreement; accountability, transparency in restoration process
  - O Agricultural challenges and opportunities
  - O Impacts of large-scale solar development

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  - O Monitoring progress toward achieving TMDL water quality goals, outcomes in Watershed Agreement; accountability, transparency in restoration process
  - O Agricultural challenges and opportunities
  - O Impacts of large-scale solar development
- Membership: 28 members (gubernatorial/mayoral appointees; appointments also made by Board of Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay)
  - O Sample of CB stakeholders, including restoration practitioners, farmers, retired government officials, policy researchers and contractors, environmental justice advocates, community organizers, educators.

- Few members interact directly with CBP workgroups this may change
- Ag interest is represented on the AC, but it is one of many interests
  - O Collective desire among group members to protect working lands and sustainable agriculture within context of accountable progress toward CBP water quality/living resources goals
- Engagement activities not presented online
  - Often informal engagement through members' networks
  - O Hosted farmer panel to discuss efficacy of nutrient management plans
  - O Hosted large-scale-solar development panel discussing pressures of solar on farmland and agrivoltaics potential
