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

Strategy Review System (Aurelia)

Supporting Documents	Purpose
Logic & Action Plan	Illustrates the links between the factors that cause impacts towards an outcome and the actions it takes to manage them.
Narrative Analysis	Analyzes progress toward an outcome for the 2-year cycle, reflects on successes and challenges, lessons learned, and impacts of recent and future science, policy, funding.
Presentation	Summarizes the information in the Logic and Action Plan and Narrative Analysis.

Benefits & Barriers Research Final Findings (Aurelia)

Objectives

How residents in the watershed use public access sites and their relationship with use and stewardship.

Barriers that prevent underserved populations from use of public access sites.

Research

Baywid survey with a total of 2,263 randomly selected adults covering topics of:

Community, Site
Contacts, Impression of
Water, Attitudes,
Connection, Wanted
Features, Motivations,
Barriers, and
Perceptions.

Final Findings

1.Prioritize investments in infrastructure

2.Experiment with education and engagement programs

3.Extend a sense of welcome and belonging

4.Gain an understanding of who is visiting and who is not
