


The Past Five Years: Milestones

Moving Forward with PA's Plan



PA's RFB Outcomes

- 83,000 acres of RFBs on agricultural lands
 - Goal set jointly by Ag Workgroup and Forestry Workgroup
- 2,650 acres of RFBs in developed areas
 - Goal set jointly by Stormwater Workgroup and Forestry Workgroup
- 7,255 acres of RFBs in Conowingo WIP
 - Goal based on 25% of the remaining unbuffered acres after goals in Phase III WIP met.
- TOTAL PA RFB GOAL = 92,905 acres





PA's Current Rate

- Need to plant ~23,000 acres/year to get to WIP goals by 2025.
- Current funding and partnership efforts are producing approximately 1,500 acres/year of new riparian forest buffers (all funding sources and programs combined).
- Focus on and integration of PA's five strategies will help to increase this annual rate of installation, getting us closer to our overall goal.

Our Plan's Five Strategies:

- 1. Convening Partners and Stakeholders
- 2. Communications and Outreach
- 3. Financial Assistance
- 4. Technical Assistance
- 5. Engaging Leadership



Riparian Forest Buffer Advisory Committee

- Primary stakeholders in PA working to develop programs, provide recommendations, share info, etc.
- Purpose- hear about what is needed, what is working, share ideas/methods/research/case studies, develop new funding and outreach programs, etc.
- Continue to foster RFBAC's excitement and energy.

Continue annual Watershed Forestry Summit

- Conference on watershed forestry implementation, outreach, science, etc.
- Well attended by 100s each year from PA and other Bay states (any beyond).

• DCNR Leadership Role in WIP Process

 Continued communication with partners and DEP; building trust.


Continue Use of Innovative Outreach Strategies in PA

Prime Prospects Project

 Utilized tax parcel data, past buffer program participants list, and consume data to develop new outreach strategy based on human dimensions/social science.


Buffer My Stream Campaign

- Worked with marketing firm to develop outreach materials based on consumed data analysis of past buffer program participants.
- Mailers sent to top Prime Prospects Candidates, resulting in above average response rates.

3. Financial Assistance

- Utilize flexible funding
 - Complimentary to CREP, EQIP, other federal programs; fills gaps.
- Match landowners to the right funding
 - Find funding that works for LOs and their properties.
- Develop new, creative methods for funding, while continuing to find funds to support tested methods
 - Flat-rate-per-acre funding; supported by NFWF; EPA.
- Encourage partners to pursue variety of grants
 - DEP, NFWF, USFS, DCNR, etc.



PA State Funding Provided for RFB Implementation

Approx. \$8,000,000 awarded since 2017 from:

- Environmental Stewardship Fund
- Keystone Rivers Fund
- Keystone Communities Fund
- Oil and Gas Well Lease Fund
- PennVest
- Keystone Tree Fund

Provided to partners primarily through C2P2 Grants, but also contracting mechanisms.

Keystone Tree Fund

- Enacted by legislature in 2019
- Generating ~\$20k per month
- Allocated through C2P2
- Funds:
 - 60% Riparian Buffer grants
 - 40% TreeVitalize
- Enables:
 - \$3 donations on vehicle registration renewals
 - Checks received from donors
 - Appropriations of the legislature



PA DCNR Buffer Grant Program Community Conservation Partnerships Program (C2P2)

- Incorporated funding for RFB in DCNR's annual grants program.
- NGOs, local govts, etc., are eligible applicants
- Funding for installation, postplanting establishment, staff time, contractors, outreach, etc.
- Min. award of \$50K/grant.
 - Larger partners providing mini-grant programs to others.
- Currently 1:1 match required.

\$908,591 awarded in 2021 that will result in an estimated 180 acres of new buffers planted

- Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay: \$500,0000- approximately 71
 acres
- Capital Area Greenbelt Association: \$54,600- approximately 12 acres
- Haverford Township: \$50,000- approximately 5 acres
- Wildlands Conservancy: \$120,000- approximately 10 acres
 Chesapeake Conservancy: \$50,000- approximately 7 acres
- Pennsylvania Association of Conservation Districts: \$100,000approximately 15 acres
- Stroud Water Research Center: \$333,991- approximately 60 acres



Demonstrated Demand

- Waitlist of landowners who have reached out to DCNR directly, or through partners, hoping to get a buffer and are waiting for funding.
- Waitlist of partners who have projects to implement, but need funds without match req. or a heavy administrative burden.
- Strong support from RFB Advisory Committee for additional flat-rate-per-acre flexible funds.
- Able to move ~\$1M/year in flexible funds with current capacity in addition to C2P2 grant program; added TA capacity will result in increased demand.

Coming Soon: Funding RFBs through ITQ

- ITQ = Invitation to Qualify.
- Planting contractors qualify via commonwealth system.
- DCNR and partners ID landowners who want buffers.
- DCNR funds buffers through hiring prequalified contractor.
- NFWF funding from INSR grant to test method.



- Clear, consistent feedback from partners suggests need to reduce administrative burden of funding available.
 - Partnership needed with funders to reduce administrative burdens on both ends to get more RFBs planted.
- External expertise needed to pursue conservation finance funding options for PA, P3, etc.
- Possibilities on the horizon: Clean Streams Fund, Growing Greener III



4. Technical Assistance

Increase overall TA capacity in PA

- Ensure TA providers understand ecosystems wholistically, can make the best choices based on individual site location.
- Ensure TA providers have thorough understanding of various funding sources; implications, rules, etc.

Set a standard of TA communication excellence

- Ensure TA providers speak the proverbial language of various LO types.
- Train TA to understand issues faced by various LOs, LO motivations, etc.

Establish TA within a variety of organizations

 Provide TA at state, local, and non-profit agencies, so that LOs have access to the type of TA that suits them best.



Current TA Capacity in PA

- DCNR Watershed Forestry Team
 - Team has expanded from 3 members in 2017, to 9 by end of 2022
 - Beginning to move to a regional approach with Regional Watershed Forestry Specialist (RWFS) positions
- DCNR Service Foresters
 - Work with C2P2 grantees
 - Assistance with planting plan development
 - At capacity with other Service Forestry work
- C2P2 Grants currently support some additional TA positions at partner organizations
- NGOs like Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay, Stroud Water Research Center, etc. provide additional TA support in PA
- PA Watershed Forestry Summit
 - Will continue hosting annually to train TA providers, continue to help build capacity and strengthen TA effectiveness at CCDs, amongst Service Foresters, and at various partner organizations
- Additional TA Capacity is needed within PA to meet current demand, and to scale up





TA Capacity Needs & New Ideas

Private Sector Technical Assistance

- Create demand to foster private sector to add TA for the right LOs.
- Continue trainings with PA SCIs to develop skilled individuals ready to step into new positions.

Consider Planting Plan Reimbursement Program

Similar to NY's existing program.

Utilize PA Outdoor Corps to Provide TA

- Continue to assist with buffer planting and maintenance on state lands.
- Explore options for deploying Outdoor Corps or similar group as a "Strike Team".

5. Engage Leadership

 Continue Engaging Leaders through Administration Transition

> Successful PA state actions described so far have come from engaged leadership

Solidify RFB Action Strategy

 Continue Collaboration between PA DCNR and PA DEP

· Phase III WIP and beyond

 Make connections with leaders on issues that matter
