A New Architectural Icon in the Nation's Capital

As the old 11th Street river bridges that connect Washington, DC's Capitol Hill and historic Anacostia neighborhoods are being replaced, the District government and a local nonprofit organization, Building Bridges Across the River at THEARC, will transform the aged infrastructure into the city's first elevated


park: a new venue for healthy recreation, environmental education and the arts.

We are proposing to create a place unlike any other in Washington, DC – one that supports the community's physical, environmental, cultural and economic health.



The community wants the 11th Street Bridge Park!

Over 450 community meetings have been held since early 2012 – in large, government-sponsored public forums and smaller gatherings – and there has been an enthusiastic response from residents on both sides of the Anacostia River and throughout the region. Community inspired programming ideas such as an outdoor amphitheatre, environmental education center, kayak / canoe launches, intergenerational play space, urban agriculture, and public art installations have been incorporated into the design. This unique park will provide visitors of all ages the ability to interact with the river, nature, art, the rich history of surrounding neighborhoods, entertainment and each other.

Creating an architectural icon

A nation-wide competition was launched in 2014 soliciting 11th Street Bridge Park designs from architects, landscape architects and structural engineers from across the country. After a seven month design competition, the design team of OMA+OLIN was unanimously selected in October 2014. OMA designer Jason Long stated, "We wanted the bridge to have a civic importance. It holds its own against very monumental elements within D.C.—but at the same time it's very approachable." National Public Radio described the design concept as an "inventive reuse of old infrastructure that could help to revitalize a long-underserved part of the city."

The 11th Street Bridge Park has four goals:

Bridging Communities

The Anacostia River has divided communities for generations. The 11th Street Bridge Park will be a place where both sides of the river can gather, have shared experiences and build social capital.

Economy

Key economic indicators for the two neighborhoods reflect a longstanding and growing disparity across the capital region. By creating a regional destination, the Bridge Park can become a magnet for new businesses on both sides of the Anacostia River.

Environment

Like many urban watersheds, the Anacostia River has long been ignored. The District of Columbia is working to clean it, but to get people to care about the Anacostia River we first need to get them down to water.

Health

The communities along the Anacostia River have the highest rates of adult obesity in the nation's capital. Studies tell us that neighborhood parks increase residents' weekly physical activity and support a healthy community.
