

Maryland Counties on Front Line

- Direct connection with Chesapeake Bay
- Maryland first state to impose nutrient pollution reduction goals directly on county governments
- Maryland posted final Phase III Watershed Implementation Plans (WIP) on August 23, 2019
 - Final Maryland 2025 targets are 45.8 million pounds nitrogen and 3.68 million pounds phosphorus per year (this will also achieve State's sediment goals)
 - Biggest reductions expected from agriculture and wastewater treatment plants





A Local Perspective

- The final push to 2025
- No more "low hanging fruit"
- Local needs more differentiated than in the past
- Have to differentiate local assistance more than in the past
- Not the end...





Help for Local Governments





Technical Assistance

- Tailor assistance to what each local jurisdiction needs
 - Revisit the needs of local governments from a regional perspective
 - "One size does not fit all"

Best practices

- Focus on what gives the best return on investment for Phase III needs or yield significant co-benefits
- Most, but not all, local jurisdictions have moved beyond the basics
- Example: Maryland and Cecil County stream restoration project through Ecosystem Investment Partners (EIP)
 - Six bundled projects treating 15 miles of streams
 - EIP covering majority of project costs up front state and county only pays when projects are finished and reducing pollution
- Continue to share success stories from other localities

Areas of focus

- Agriculture
- Forestlands and vegetated buffers
- Stormwater






Dealing with Uncertainties

- Prepare local governments to deal with the uncertainties and changing targets under the Phase III WIP
- New climate change goals in 2022
- Accounting for growth
- Conowingo Dam WIP









Financial Assistance

- Identify funding sources
 - Federal and state monies
 - Grants and loans
 - Maximizing local government funding
 - Unique funding structures such as "green financing" and other alternative financing methods
- Developing long-range financial plans
- How to "recession-proof" a WIP budget





Public Education

- Educational materials and talking points for local governments to use with their constituents
 - Value and benefits of the Chesapeake Bay
 - Value and benefits of local water quality
- Stress economic, health and environmental benefits
- Make it "real" by providing success stories that have tangible public benefits and outcomes
- Prepare public for ongoing efforts 2025 is not
